


### **Course Schedule**

#### What is a learner diary?

A learner diary is the place where you record your learning experiences. Your diary is for your personal use. It will provide you and your tutor with an insight into your learning.

#### What should I put into my learner diary?

It should include anything you regard as relevant to your learning. We strongly encourage you to consider it as an integral part of your learning. You should aim to add things to it at least every three weeks.

#### What will happen with my learner diary?

It will not be "graded" but, if regularly maintained, your diary may count as part of the overall assessment.

#### Why should I use a learner diary?

We would like to stress how important a learner diary can be as an aid to self-expression and critical reflection. It is also a record of learning activities: what you did, when, where and with whom, how much time you spent, etc. However, its true value is as a learning tool.

#### **How do I use my learner diary?**

The purpose of your learner diary is to encourage you to make your learning personal by thinking about and articulating your thoughts. These are examples of questions that you can choose to think about in your diary: What was new, easy and/or difficult? What did I like/what did I not like, and why? What did I learn today and how will I apply that learning in practice? etc.

Learner diaries serve to stimulate critical thinking. The golden rule is: Use your diary on a regular basis. Experiment with different styles, writing for yourself, a tutor, a newspaper, the www. You can write in English, in your mother tongue, in both languages, use graphics, hand drawings, lists, cut and paste. Make it as individual and as creative as you like.
